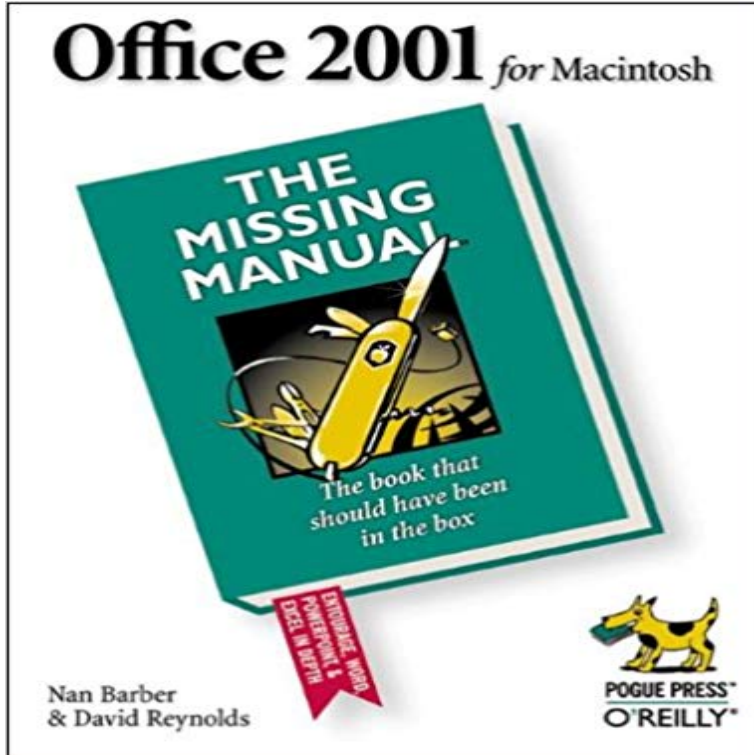


Office 2001 for Macintosh: The Missing Manual
