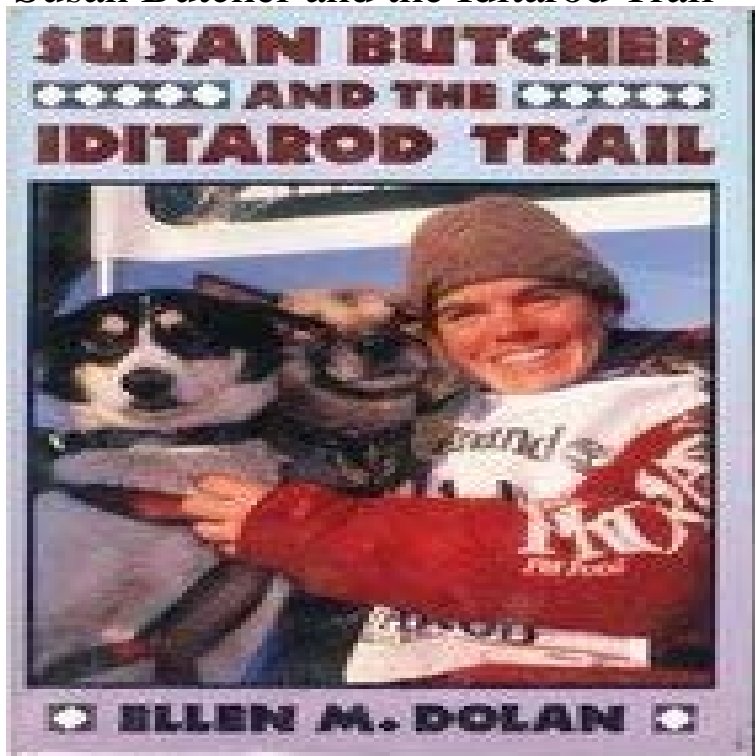


Susan Butcher and the Iditarod Trail
