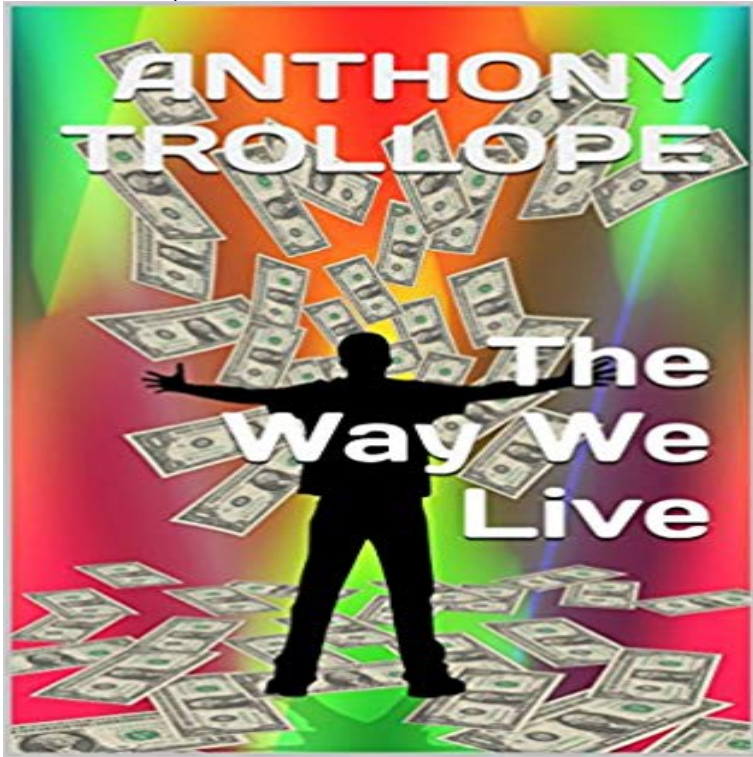


The Way We Live

Forced by financial pressure he forges some documents with regard to a property and now the law is not far behind him.
