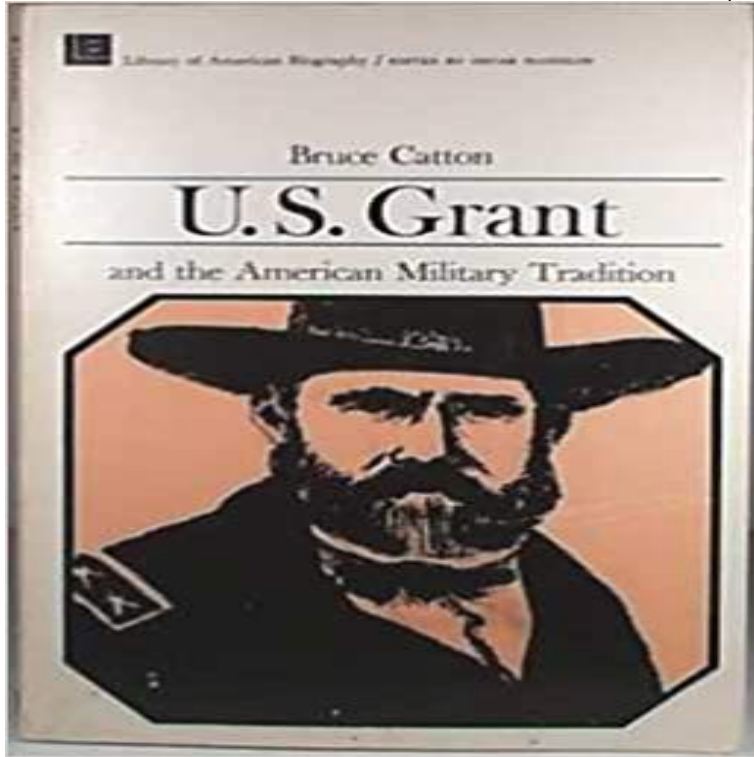


U.S. Grant and the American Military Tradition.

Lees surrender at Appomattox Court House, which solidified Grant as a figure of national acclaim. Catton then explores Grants two-term presidency and final years, casting an illuminating new light on a complex and controversial national figure whose great accomplishments have all too often been downplayed or overlooked.
